2023 NAVIGATORS' CUP - KITE RUNNER'S VIEW

The Navigators Cup is a yacht race commemorating Australia's historical sailing links with Botany Bay – our first port. It celebrates the outstanding achievements of those great navigators, Lieutenant James Cook and Le Compte Jean-François Galaup de La Perouse, both later died terrible deaths so let's not go there. Kite Runner's goal was to finish within 27 minutes to Sea Hawk , 10 minutes to Flash Dance 2 and ahead of last years winners, Brand X.

The day arrived for the much anticipated 25th running of the Navigators Cup but the breeze just didn't want to cooperate at first. At the scheduled starting time there was barely a zephyr and a runout tide pushing the fleet over the starting line so the AP pennant was flown. There was some weather happening with passing squalls and just 10 minutes later the call to Huey was answered with enough wind to commence the starting sequence. With the preferred starter boat end looking crowded we on Kite Runner opted for the pin end and got off to a nice clear start. We could hear some worrying sounds from afar as some of the fleet were bunching and "touching" at the other end of the line.

However, after a nice reach out past Osborn Shoal the breeze just vanished. We all just came to a halt. The tide taking over again as Neptune reaching up from below was tickling our keels and poking out rudders, sending some of us into circles like we were caught in his whirlpool of torment. The frustration levels were high when the radio was lighting up with traffic communicating withdrawals one by one... but the Kite Runner crew could see the rain squall coming from the east... age and optimism whispered to us that sometimes wind will follow. We decided to stay put. Our reward was just a few drops of rain followed by a sweet Force 4 ENE'er. Before long the remaining fleet was scooting along with Spinnakers flying doing 6-8knots boat speed.

We entered into Botany Bay alongside Ambush, Marri Nuwi and the in-form Brand X, as Flash Dance 2 and Sea Hawk were exiting. Gybing once turned at the Captain Cook transit line to work back out of the heads, with our Coach barking instructions from his floating white palace. We gave Cape Banks' reef just enough clearance to be respectful, but I wouldn't dare go close in a big swell, and turned left for Coogee.

As we passed Boora Point we had enough leeway to crack the Code Zero, and what a beautiful sight that was. This Ian Short made furling gennaker sail is a weapon on its day and she paid for herself during this race. The sail was amazing... it's like having a silver bullet. It doesn't get used often but when it's on, it's ON!

With the Code Zero up at this tight apparent wind angle we were on the edge the whole way, scraping past Mistral Point to near the ever popular swimming baths, Mahon Pool, and around Wedding Cake island.

Brand X was in the rear vision mirror when we rounded the reef to return home. The Code Zero was on display again heading 180 and then 200 degrees as we passed Botany Bay nicely timing a container ship exiting Port Botany.

We could see Flashdance and Sea Hawk now flying spinnakers ahead of us. The Code Zero was losing its potency as we bared away so out came the snatch block and a spare spinnaker sheet. Our crew hoisted our "Kite Runner" blue A2 spinnaker at Potter Point and peeled the Code Zero and accelerated once again coming in to the finish line at Port Hacking Estuary.

Finishing we thought that we had a chance for a place but never expected to win this race. As I said at the presentation afterwards, 30 years ago sailing with the PHOYC I would never have dreamed of winning this race with my own yacht. Kite Runner had a huge race and our crew were faultless with sail handling and even performed a sharp spinnaker peel from Code 0 to Assy Spinnaker to get us home across Bate Bay. We all just didn't stop working hard to keep the boat moving as fast as possible. This has always been my favourite race with its fantastic scenery, and this has just cemented that sentiment! Thanks to my awesome crew Greg Spencer, Jim Bennett, Alex Naylor, Matt Lohmeyer, James Naylor, Chris McGoldrick and Pete Evans. Whooohooo!





The forecast for Sunday was for 28 knots from the South from around 9am. The officials decided to start the day with an adventure paddling race whilst they monitored conditions. PROTEST CULTURE

You may have noticed that CSC and our membership are becoming very involved in regatta events again. For this very reason, in recent months we have talked a lot about how important it is for our sailors to understand the Racing Rules of Sailing and the intricacies of protesting and being protested, specifically RRS PART 5. It doesn't stop there, it is also vital that we strengthen our Protest Committee culture and become more efficient in processing hearing requests.

To this end we all need to be aware that lodging a hearing request form comes with **Sailing Instruction time limits** that will in the majority of cases be **strictly enforced**. Within that time limit the protester must complete and lodge a valid current Australian Sailing <u>Protest Hearing Request Form</u>. At CSC, to reduce the burden on the protest parties, witnesses, and jury members, the protest hearings will in most cases be held on the day immediately following any Arbitration attempt. Please don't make the job of the hearing committee any harder, that means that the Protester, the Protested, and all Witnesses must standby ready to attend.

CSC's goal will always be to swiftly arrive at a clear, fair and RRS rules based decision.

Of course, all these good intentions rely heavily on CSC's ability to convene a Jury Panel that holds no conflict of interests. To streamline this process we need CSC members to be ready and willing to stand as Jurors. The CSC Protest Group was formed about a year ago to encourage, educate and upskill our current and prospective jury members.

Just one of the resources available to us is the free and very informative Australian Sailing Protest Committee Online Course. This qualification is a great way to fast track your knowledge of protests and at the same time support your Club, it's easily completed in multiple sessions or you can do the whole course in less than one rainy day!
